The inmates fight amongst themselves, despite their common enemy and the Americans are a particularly troublesome group. When the governor's daughter becomes romantically involved with one of them, he orders his soldiers to open fire during a minor disturbance, even though the war has ended and personal revenge is suspected as his true motivation.

To Shine And Cast No Shadows brings to light the deeper meaning beneath the awkward struggles that have led a young man towards the realization of his enlightenment.
